HAA and University Updates

Update on Spring 2022 Reunion Dates

As you know, Harvard and Radcliffe College Reunions and the Annual Meeting will now take place the week following University Commencement, with the

Annual Meeting falling on Friday, June 3, 2022. As the number of both Commencement and Reunions attendees has grown significantly (now 8,000 graduates and 13,000 alumni returning to campus), access to space and campus resources has been considerately constrained. With this in mind, giving alumni unfettered access to campus including spaces, housing, and hotels was a driving force behind the decision to move both Reunions and the Annual Meeting.

We know you have many questions on the background of this decision and what this means for reunioning classes this year and in the future. In response to your outreach, we've put together a <u>Q&A document</u> on the Officers Lounge to share more on these changes. We encourage you to read this document and reach out to your staff liaison if you have further questions.

AHCCS&T Fall Social Event

On November 4, 2021, the College Alumni Programs team hosted a pilot virtual Content & Social Event for the AHCCS&T membership. In addition to HAA staff, we were joined by 65 class secretaries and treasurers spanning the Classes of 1951–2021. This event was inspired by feedback from both Renny Little, secretary for the Class of 1955, and Chris Duble, secretary for the Class of 1975, who mentioned how beneficial it would be to convene this group of class officers—with the goals of forming relationships across classes, sharing best practices, and asking questions—outside of the format of the AHCCS&T Annual Meeting (which this year will take place in April 2022, date TBD). Tom Quirk, treasurer for the Class of 1974 and president of the AHCCS&T, convened the group. HAA Executive Director Philip Lovejoy provided a brief update on the College and University and then entertained a Q&A session. The balance of the virtual event was spent in two sets of breakout rooms. Feedback on the event was largely positive, and it is likely that we will continue to offer an event like this next fall.

Maintained by the Center for Public Service and Engaged Scholarship, alumni can post volunteer opportunities on behalf of their service organizations. - The Harvard Alumni Association Alumni Directory is your comprehensive resource for staying in touch with classmates and other alumni around the world. College students can also use this platform to make connections with those in their area or expected field. <u>Make sure your</u> <u>profile is up to date</u> with your most recent contact information so students can reach out to you.
- The Office of Career Services' <u>Firsthand Advisers platform</u> provides scheduling and connection tools. Alumni can offer 30–60 minutes to engage in a mock interview, review a resume or CV, or have a career chat. - Help current Harvard College students build valuable networking skills by signing up for a Networking 101 event. These events, which will be held

As a member of AHCCS&T, the HAA offers you alumni broadcast email services. We have redesigned the <u>HAA's email service</u> document on the Officers Lounge; this resource outlines the information we need in order to create and send your email, and the guidelines that govern this process. Alternately, we encourage you to use an email client that works best for you to regularly communicate with your classmates. If you choose to use a third-party broadcast email client instead of sending class-wide emails through the HAA email service, please consider <u>these best practices</u>. We recommend emailing your classmates no more than two times per month.
